
Values

Hospice in 1979 by a group of volunteers
dedicated to ensuring that terminally ill
patients were able to die with dignity and
respect. Patient/family support volunteers
reach out with compassion to hospice
patients and their families as part of our
hospice patients team. They provide a caring
presence to patients wherever they live and
emotional and practical support for families
and caregivers.





We offer a variety of volunteer opportunities including administrative and office support, care shawl project, clerical services, special events, hospice in-home patient and family support, Hock Family Pavilion, pet visits, and music visits.

Volunteer Practice Standards National Hospice and Palliative Care Organization (NHPCO)

- DHCH staff will recruit volunteers which reflect the diversity of the patient population.
- DHCH process for volunteer recruitment and selection is consistent with DUHS nondiscrimination policies.
- DHCH will select volunteer applicants, in coordination with DUHS Volunteer Services, with the highest level of qualifications. The selection process will include completing an initial application, a personal interview, a medical screen, a criminal background check, and completion of all other verification procedures as outlined in current regulatory requirements.
- Volunteers will be matched to their assigned tasks based on their preference, skills, competency, and experience.
- Volunteers will have access to current information which is relevant to their chosen tasks and hospice practice.
